The Senior Class Play



MARCH



6th—Today the chorus went to Sanford to the Musical Festival and without a doubt represented me in a credible way. They're not the kind to let me down.




The Future Farmers were again very successful in their summer projects. An acre of corn and an acre of squash were raised with a profit of about \$500.00 being realized.


Le Cercle Francais is a new club organized this year by the French students.




Prize Speaking


A great deal of credit goes to our coach, Mrs. Lamb, for her patience and leadership.



Greeted by only one "first team veteran," Clarence Gordon, Coach Stinchfield went to work with thirty willing boys and molded a basketball team. It just wasn't in the cards for Gorham this year, however, as they only won five games while dropping eleven. The prospects for next year are very encouraging with four of the first team men returning.

Gorham opened its season and was trounced by the Alumni 46-23. Falmouth came to town next and was hard pressed but finally won 51-37. On December 6, Greely came to do battle with the Rams. Gorham led until the last quarter, but lost 44-38. Gorham journeyed to Cape and lost a closely contested battle 41-36. Gorham won a very close decision from our cross-town rivals, Windham, 48-46. 

On September 29 Windham journeyed to Gorham and in a close finish, Windham again defeated Gorham 25-30, although Dean Evans came in first.


In the ensuing meets Gorham was defeated by Gould Academy, Traip Academy, York, Deering, Portland and Windham in a triangular meet.

Girls' Swimming


On October 21, six girls coached by Miss Hurd represented Gorham in the annual Triple-C swimming meet in Portland.



