






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Theme

In 1764 Gorham was the twentieth town to be incorporated in Maine. Founded as the direct result of a war with the Narragansett Indians, the town now stands on a tract of land that was granted to Captain John Gorham as a reward for his valor.

From the time of its settlement by Captain John Phinney and his son, Gorham grew despite the all-too-frequent attacks of hostile Indians. By the 19th century it was a thriving community, though much smaller than it is today. In 1889 Gorham High School, then located in the present fire barn, graduated its first class which consisted of three students. This year the graduating class will number over 120!

Gorham went down in history as being the first town to reserve for the young a specified place for recreational purposes. The Robie Recreation Park consisted of a baseball diamond which is now located between the high and junior high schools.

The History of Gorham is steeped in excitement and tradition; yet as the town has changed, so the way of life and the traditions have changed. To us, the students of Gorham High School, the past has blended with the present to become an integral part of us. We will base our lives on the past, but we will carry on the work of our forefathers in developing new traditions for our posterity.

However, five of these losses were by only one goal. Next year's team has nine lettermen returning and should be a threat to the Triple-C title with a strong defense and good scoring possibilities.



Distance-Men Unbeaten in Regular Season

Gorham High School's Cross Country Team has remained undefeated for eight years. Even though the Gorham seven placed fourth in the State Class-M cross country meet at Orono on October 29, they did defeat every team they ran against during the regular season.

Gorham's first meet of the season was with Scarborough High. Gorham entered eleven runners and placed eleven runners before the first Redskin crossed the line. Gorham's next victim was Gould Academy by a slim two points—27-29. Gilman placed first for Gorham in this meet. John Peterson proved the winning factor by out-sprinting a man from Gould on the final straight-away.

Next, Gorham easily beat this year's State S champions, Richmond High, by a score of 23-38. Then Gorham journeyed to Bowdoin where a five-place tie for first gave the Rams a 15-50 victory.

Gorham was just barely beaten by Gray-New Gloucester for the Triple-C title on a rugged 2.6 mile course at the Gorham Country Club. This bad luck seemed to haunt the Rams through their next two big meets for they placed fourth in both the Southwestern and the State. Fine performances were turned in by all the boys this year. Coach Evans will be losing two seniors through graduation, Frank Burnell, and David Graham.




Michael Gilman placed third at the Triple-C Cross Country Meet held at the Gorham Country Club on October 16th.







AFS . . . Walk Together, Talk Together

Since it was begun in the spring of 1964, the AFS Club has been one of the busiest organizations at GHS. Its purpose is to promote the American Field Service in Gorham, to raise money to bring another foreign-exchange student to GHS, and to assist in sending abroad any students chosen for the Americans Abroad program. The chief money-raising project of the year was the annual AFS Fair at which over \$800 was made. Club members also sponsored an AFS night at which American Abroad students gave talks. The proceeds were used to buy Scholarships for former GHS exchange students and also to start an AFS showcase for the school.

Walk together, talk together all ye peoples of the earth, for then and only then shall ye have peace! This one sentence from the Bible embodies all the hopes, aims, and promises of a strange and wonderful program called the American Field Service: peace—between people, between communities, between countries, and most of all, peace within one single human being.

I will never forget my ecstasy of May 23, 1964 when I received my acceptance letter from AFS, New York, saying that I had been chosen as an American Abroad to Finland. It was a dream come true for me—something that I had longed for with all my heart.

On June 27th, with an open heart and mind, I set out on the greatest adventure of my life! With some 540 other anxious, thrilled, and somewhat scared teen-agers, I listened to the encouraging words of Mr. Stephen A. Gallati, the head of AFS—"As you cross that gangplank, you leave America behind you, everything behind you. But there is a new life ahead of each and every one of you . . . You deserve the very best. God bless you all!" These words were especially meaningful to us as Mr. Gallati, who had devoted his entire life to AFS, died only a few weeks later. We were the last group he ever saw off—he gave us that extra incentive.

The trip on "The Seven Seas" was an experience in itself! We had language and orientation classes each day to help the 54 of us going to Finland to become acquainted with the language and customs of our new country. Aside from our country group activities, there were numerous other things to keep us busy: public forums, hootenannies, dances, movies, masquerade parties, talent shows, pool-packing parties (someone turned on the water) an international sing, and on and on.

The voyage passed quickly, and on July 7th, the screams outside my door told me we were about to dock in Rotterdam. On July 9th, after a 50 hour train ride with no sleep (the steel baggage racks were too hard, and besides, I have a phobia about falling off high places), we arrived in Finland.

When I met my Finnish family, I knew immediately that I would have a wonderful summer—despite the fact that only my sister, Kirsti, spoke English. First there was isä, or father. A kind, happy man, he always used to beam with pride when he said an English word. Äiti, or mother, delighted in teaching

me Finnish and always used to call me "makkara kissa" or sausage cat because I ate so many sausages! I guess that is where all the extra poundage came from! Tapani, my 15 year old brother, was really shy at first. He would not even speak Finnish to me! He soon got over that, though; and one day, deciding I did not know enough about farm machinery, he sat me down for one hour and explained it all to me, in Finnish! Mummu, or grandmother, loved to ready the sauna for me, and although we had difficulty in communicating, we got along beautifully together. Kirsti, my 17 year old sister, was an angel. We enjoyed many of the same things, and her translating was indispensable!

Although my stay in Finland was short, I had the opportunity to see much of the country. Lapland, where I spent nearly two weeks, impressed me the most. The first time I saw it was in the rain; and its rolling fells, shrouded in a blue mist, seemed distant and ethereal. Trees grew everywhere—bent into the grotesque shapes of rheumatic old men, and everything seemed



indefinite and hazy. I watched reindeer munching grass near our tents, so much a part of this rugged, lonely world I found myself in. While at Lake Inari, far above the Arctic Circle, I went fishing under a sunlit sky at 3 o'clock in the morning! I also took a sauna, the Finnish steam bath, that reached 216°! Oh, how I loved the sauna!

Soon, too soon, it was time to leave. I had come to love the Karjalainens dearly. They had taught me many things: independence, self-reliance, courage, understanding, and inner peace . . . They had taught me that one does not have to be born into a family to become a part of it. Watching their faces fade away and knowing I might never see them again was one of the hardest moments of my life. But that is AFS. You meet people, and you say goodbye; but you never forget. It is all wonderful. It is the most wonderful part of my life.

Many small rivers make a great river—a river of peace covering the whole earth. I hope I contributed to such a river.



The Gorham High Rams had another highly successful season this year under Coach Dean Evans. The well-balanced, free-wheeling combo won the Triple-C League Championship for the second time in three years, as well as leading the Western-L Division at the close of the season. The starting five were co-captains Eric Bachelder and Sherb Bridges, both seniors, and juniors Pete Hooper, Terry Hadlock, and Marty Magnusson.


With an over all win-loss record of 15-3, the Rams of 1964-1965 can certainly be considered one of the most successful teams in Gorham High's history. Good shooting, rebounding, and determination combined with Mr. Evans' coaching overcame odds against the team such as height and experience.

The Rams finished up the regular season by trouncing the Bonney Eagle Scots 77-44 with Eric Bachelder scoring 23 points followed closely by Marty Magusson's 20.

Center, Pete Hooper, became the first Ram in many a year to score more than sixty points in two games. Along with outstanding rebounding, Pete tallied 30 points against the Falmouth Yachtsmen, and 31 points in the Windham game the preceding week.

A scrappy offense was the big key to Gorham's successful year in basketball. The Rams finished with 1,161 points or a 14 game average of 72.6 points per game. Six games were won by over 20 points with the closest game being with Cape Elizabeth when Pete Hooper's foul shot dissipated any of the Caper's hopes of an overtime.



Eric Bachelder and Marty Magnusson battle to get the rebound for the Rams as Gorham dumps Greely 78-53.





Gorham High's basketball team entered the Class L tournament playoffs in first place. At the first tournament game, the Rams defeated the Kennebunk team 59-54. Gorham has many fine players from the Junior Class returning, thus giving the Rams an advantage to become next year's Class-L champions.



Valuable experience was gained on Coach Beedy's team by Varsity squad members Deas, Burnell, Good and Bachelder.







Scarborough 62-16





Horace Fogg, '65 co-captain, had a three win, two loss record in 31 1/3 innings.




The Rams closed the 1964 baseball season with a .298 batting average and a .899 fielding average.

The number of spectators at the girls' games increased with each success.






One of the most promising new runners on the Gorham High School track team, Steve Cooper is seen here taking a commanding lead over his opponent.






After two years in the U.S. Army, Mr. Dugas played for the St. Louis Cardinals for three years.

The Guidance Department of Gorham High School plays an important part in the lives of the students and is instrumental in helping GHSers adapt to high school life and also in preparing them for worthwhile and well-fulfilled futures. In order to better meet the needs of the growing student body, another guidance counselor, Mrs. Angeline Colpitts, has been added to the faculty this year. Furthermore, the guidance office has been moved into what was formerly the clinic in order to provide another counseling booth and more room in which to keep records and catalogues.

The four main functions which the department must provide are the keeping of individual inventory; the provision of information service, and counseling service; and research and evaluation.

The Individual Inventory consists of data gathered on each student. This is done by means of observation, standardized tests, pupil needs, and case conferences.

The Information Service provides students with information regarding school regulations, courses, and curricula; occupations, colleges, and scholarships.

As a Counseling Service, the department attempts to aid each student in the achievement of personal adequacy and effectiveness through self-knowledge, through awareness of surroundings, through mastering of self-environment, and through orientation upon social and spiritual values.

Its final function is the interpretation of data bearing upon guidance operation and the devising of a procedure for appraising the outcome of services upon the school.



Math Courses Stimulate Analytical Thinking

During the 1964-1965 school year the Mathematics Department is continuing its efforts in the development of modern concepts. Its stress on these ideas is for the purpose of strengthening the student's ability to see relationships, and to reason deductively.

It should be noted that we do not leave behind any basic skills, but that we endeavor to enrich them with the best that modern mathematics has to offer. It is the belief of the Department that neglect of these skills in the development of the backbone of the mathematical structure could be disastrous.

In order to preserve continuity in the courses, we are using a full series of texts (grades 9-12) published by the same company. This prevents gaps in the work or overlapping of material.

In the mathematics courses for seniors and juniors, a more extensive use of the overhead projector is made. Prepared transparencies give opportunity for wide coverage of the work at hand. Also, a variety of mathematical models are used to good advantage.

As usual the national competitive examination, sponsored by the Mathematical Association of America and the Society of Actuaries, was taken by approximately eighty students.

Through the cooperative efforts of our capable librarian, the Department has expanded its mathematical library to a marked degree, thus enabling the student to develop his or her interests.




Communication Is a Never Ending Process

This year a flexible new program for grades 9-12 has been added to the English department of Gorham High School. In an endeavor to meet individual achievements and to appeal to individual interests, the program has been planned such that the students may elect at least one preferred course of study during the year.

Credits for a year of English have been broken into four one-quarter points, providing each student with an opportunity to elect an extra course of his choice for only part of a year. Through the scheduling of classes it is possible for students to move easily from one level of achievement to another, as his habits of study and achievement mark his progress.

The Gorham High School Library provides a core for the instructional program. Its purpose is to serve each individual associated with the school by providing materials to support and enrich the curriculum, to encourage self-development, to give background information for intelligent thinking, and to enhance leisure time. To help accomplish this, the library has approximately 4600 books and subscribes to 40 magazines and four newspapers. But even this is not enough to adequately serve our needs.

Change is the keynote to our time, and the next few years will, hopefully, see a change from the traditional concept of a library as a roomful of books and bookshelves. Films, filmstrips, maps, transparencies, slides, pictures, electronic tapes, recordings, and learning programs will be added. This change will take time, money, and more space. However, programmed texts in a few subjects will be available next year for those who want to take advantage of self-instruction texts. This will be the first of many new aspects of library service offered at Gorham High School.




We have also attempted to develop such skills in students as analyzing and evaluating data, making judgments, forming generalizations, expressing ideas in writing or orally and basically understanding our economic system as well as others.

We have employed audio-visual aids, newspapers for current events, the fine collection of social studies books in the library, and qualified visiting speakers.

The department courses of study include United States History, Economic Geography, Business Economics, Civil Government, Ancient History, World History, and Modern History.

Foreign Language . . . Emphasizes Culture

The Language Department of Gorham High School offers three years of French and two years of Latin to fill the needs of the college-preparatory student. In attempting to measure up to the demands of the modern program, the department now places more stress on oral work than in previous years. However, a solid grounding in grammar and usage is still considered to be the basis of proficiency.

New this year is Mr. Fournier, who formerly taught in New Amsterdam, New York. In French, he has introduced the Audio-Lingual Method, the purpose of which is to teach the student to think clearly and express himself in the language. Each week students listen to tapes of dialogues and exercises in the text-



books. Describing scenes on posters enables the student to perfect his conversation.



In the advanced French classes, extensive reading and writing have been emphasized with special attention given to the literature, history, and culture of France.

Latin has been found to be valuable in increasing the student's English vocabulary and providing a sound background for the study of other languages. Mrs. Downing has found that the new texts being used this year emphasize reading earlier and make the course more interesting and worthwhile. These books are more like those being used in modern-language courses. For the first time in several years, Latin III will be offered in 1965.



The Physics course as well as chemistry is arranged with classes five days a week plus two additional lab periods.

In order to provide better continuity in the science course, exchange meetings were held between the high school and the junior high in an attempt to acquaint each with the program the other was endeavoring to carry on. In this way, it was hoped that repetition could be eliminated and the science program thus strengthened.

Freshman students generally take the Earth Science course which consists of the study of astronomy, geology, meteorology, and oceanography.

Biology is offered primarily to sophomores. With more prepared slides being available greater use can be made of laboratory exercises in the use of the microscope. Additional equipment has facilitated dissecting work in the laboratory.

Science Program Challenged Active Minds

Enrollment in chemistry has reached a new high this year with approximately 125 students in six different classes. With all five sections of College Chemistry using the same text and laboratory manual, a certain measure of flexibility in scheduling has been achieved. In an effort to enhance student interest in the General Chemistry course, one class period per week is now being devoted to laboratory work.

Following the modern approach, the physics course covers less topical material than is sometimes presented in other courses. This is done in favor of a more penetrating analysis of areas which contribute most heavily to an understanding of an atomic picture of the universe. Emphasis is placed on the laboratory work to explain the theory found in the text.

Mr. Scribner gives preparatory instruction as to the dissection of a frog. Students also dissect worms, crayfish, starfish, clams, and locusts.



Physical Fitness Is Stressed by Competition

Gorham High's boy's physical education program is planned to help all boys by a variety of feats throughout the school year.

The school is well-supplied with athletic equipment. Several of the newer pieces of equipment are the rings and the peg board.

In the fall, the boys participate in soccer and football. These games are followed by feats of skill on the trampoline and peg board.

The third quarter is started with volleyball. After vacation, the boys have sessions in calisthenics, followed by performances on the horse, the rings, and various other apparatus. Finally in the spring, the boys compete with each other in softball.

Although the 250 boys participate in all activities earnestly, the most effort is put into stampeding the girls on the way to the showers.

The girl's physical education classes this year have seen lots of fun and competition. In the physical fitness tests given each year, many students have excelled. Sophomores Alyson Martin and Barbara Howard both reached 7'8" in the standing broad jump; Carol Wicks, also a sophomore, topped with 130 sit-ups. Alyson Martin made 21 holes in the peg board used by the boys physical education classes. In pushups, Deborah Hale, a sophomore, and senior Bonnie Bruton, excelled with 60 and 62 pushups respectively.

The trampoline again is popular, as are the horse and the earlier soccer, hockey, basketball, and volleyball programs.




The Business Education Course was changed this year so that there would be two sufficient areas for the business student—secretarial and business preparatory. The secretarial course has as its requirements, in addition to basic business subjects, two years of shorthand, of typing, and also of secretarial training. The business preparatory course has as its requirements two years of bookkeeping, business law, business economics, and clerical office practice. It is found that more emphasis on proficiency will assist the business education student in competing for jobs in industries.

In forthcoming years even more emphasis will be placed on the school subjects so that a business education graduate will be able to compete effectively for the better office position which will become available to the high school graduate.

Health, safety, and management are incorporated in each of the various areas of homemaking. These include:

- a) Personal and Family Relationships.
- b) Child Care and Guidance.
- c) Home Management and Consumer Buying.
- d) Home Improvement and Housing.
- e) Foods and Nutrition.
- f) Clothing, Grooming, and Textiles.
- g) Family Health and Safety.

The program provides both lab and non-lab experiences in class, while home experiences outside of class provide real life situations leading to the further development of skills and knowledge in home making activities.

This year Mrs. Putney was aided in teaching the Home Ec. Course by student teachers from Farmington State Teacher's College.





Revised Curriculum for Industrial Arts



The Industrial Education Program has undergone several changes in preparation for the school year 1964-65. The transfer of Mr. Stevens into the field of industrial arts has greatly improved the possibilities of expanding the original curriculum, and at the same time has given the opportunity for a larger enrollment. The present enrollment in the program is double that of the combined programs of last year.

While the original program has been reorganized, two new programs have been added to include a more desirable curriculum, with opportunity for three different emphasis.

The first, a broad Industrial Arts Education with pre-vocational emphasis, is a program designed to interpret industry, while stressing the solution of problems through experiences with tools,

materials, and processes.

The second, with a pre-engineering emphasis, is a program including industrial design, solution of industrial problems through graphic representation, and an introduction to manufacturing industries. It is hoped that this phase of the curriculum will be eventually expanded to include any college student who is interested in specialization in one of the major fields of engineering.

The third, with a specialized industrial arts emphasis, is a program based on the study of jobs or occupations in industry and the community. The particular emphasis will be pre-occupational preparation and practical work experiences with tools, materials, and processes relating to common occupations.

It is felt that the outcomes of all new courses have been realized to a considerable degree.
