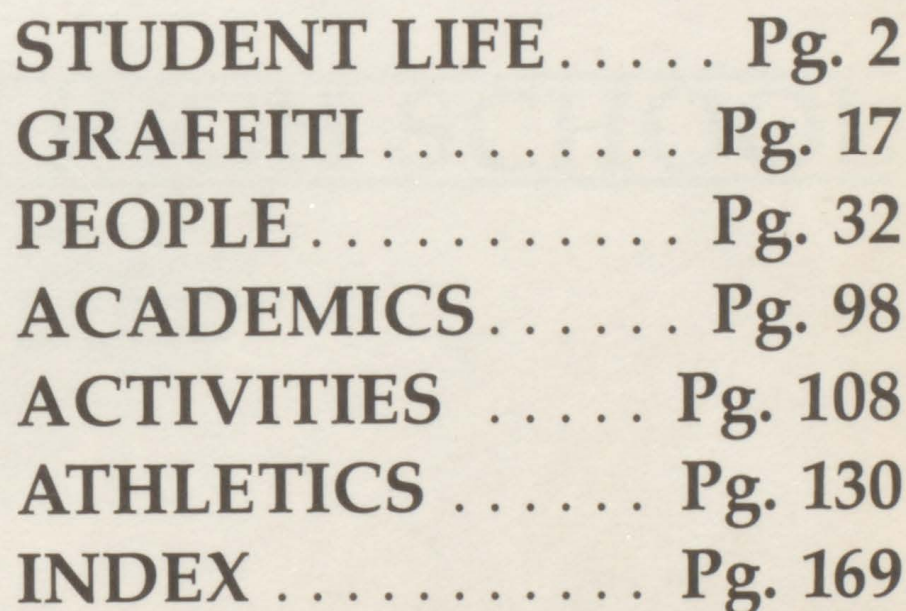


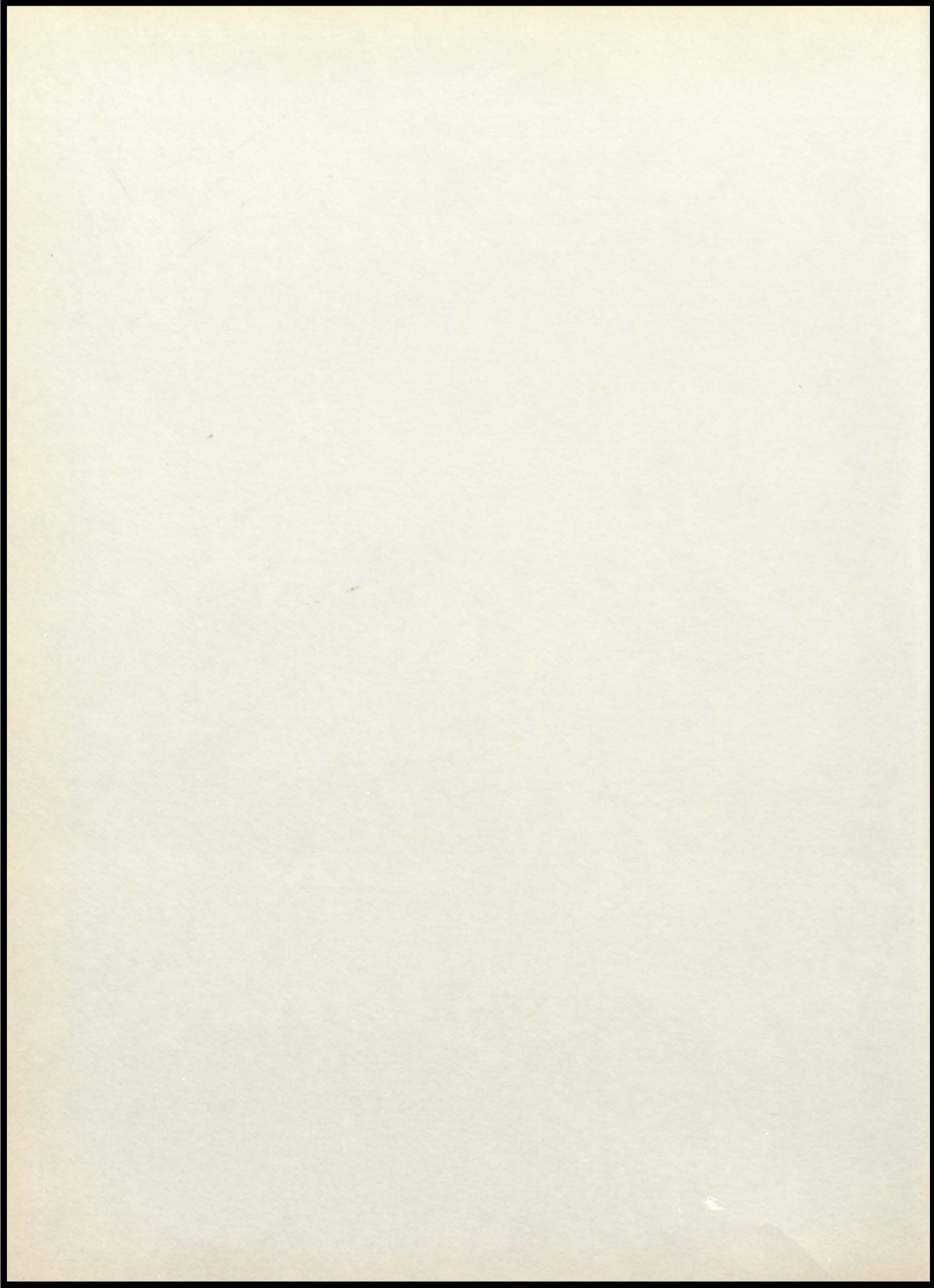

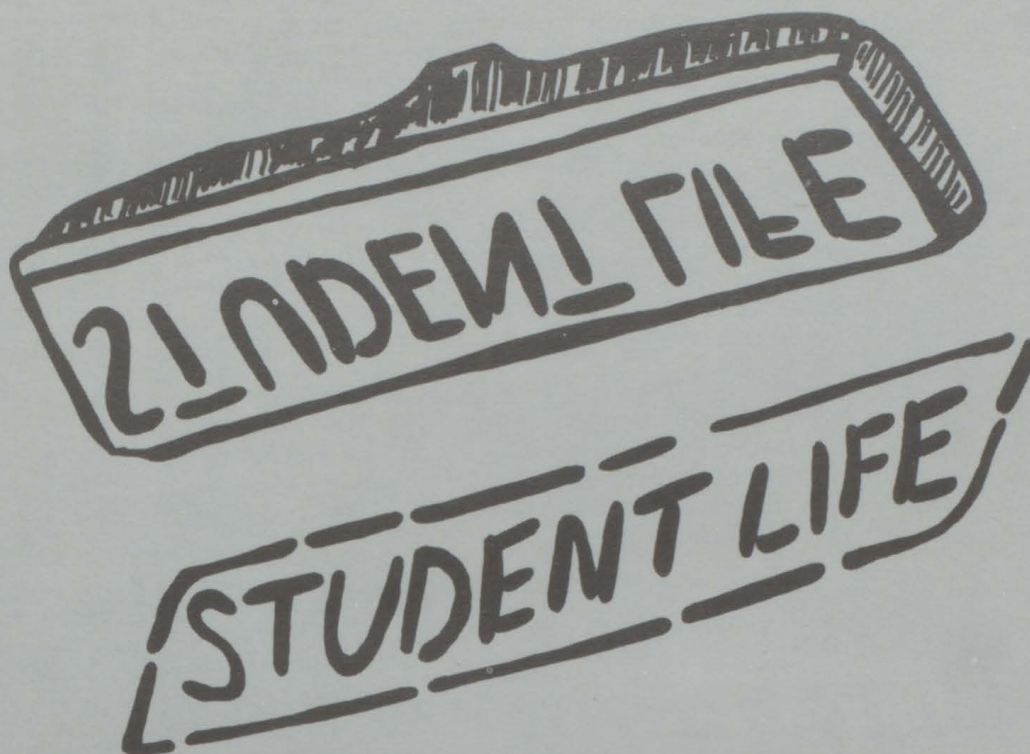

Grades sky-rocketed with more competition among the top ten seniors than ever before. And yet students still found time to participate in extracurricular activities offered around the school.

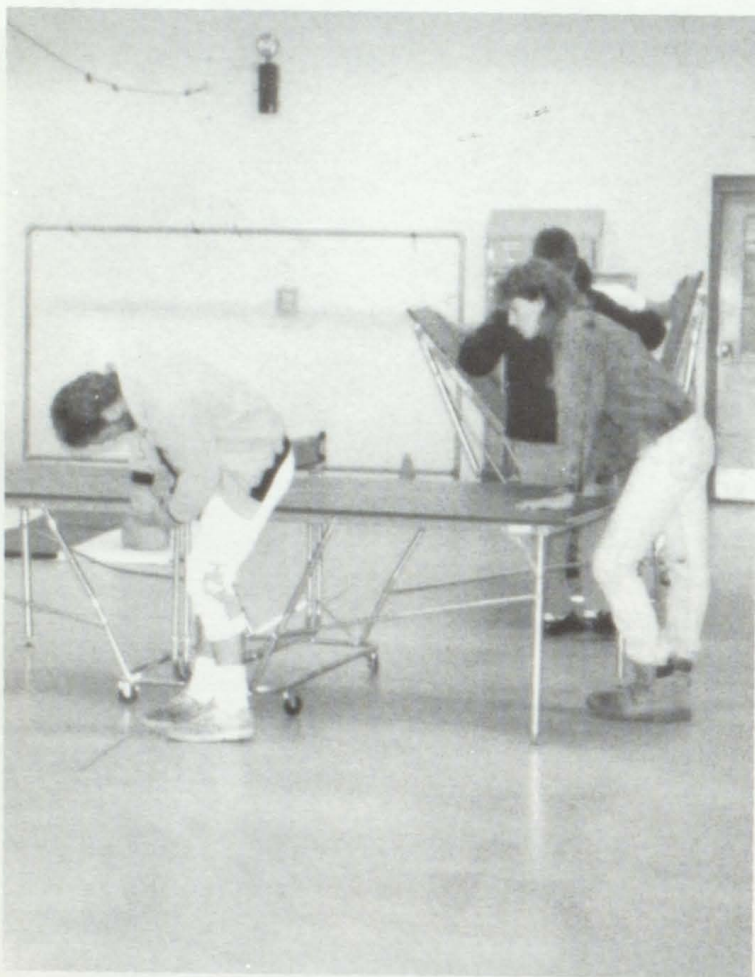

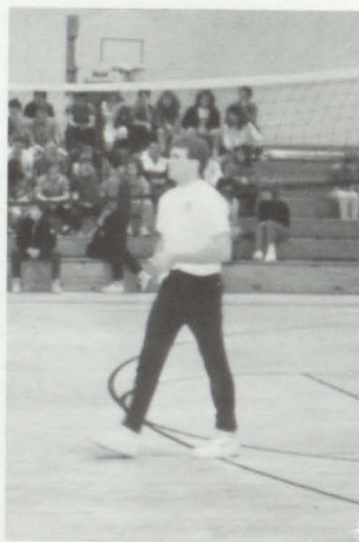

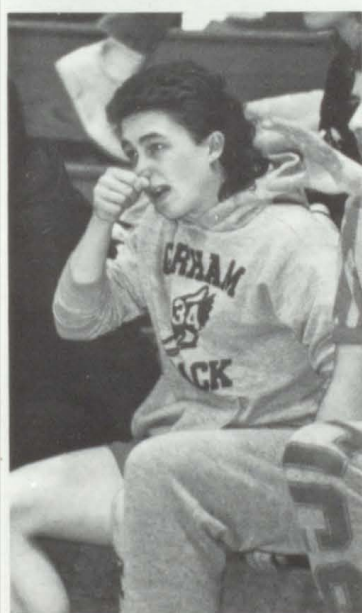

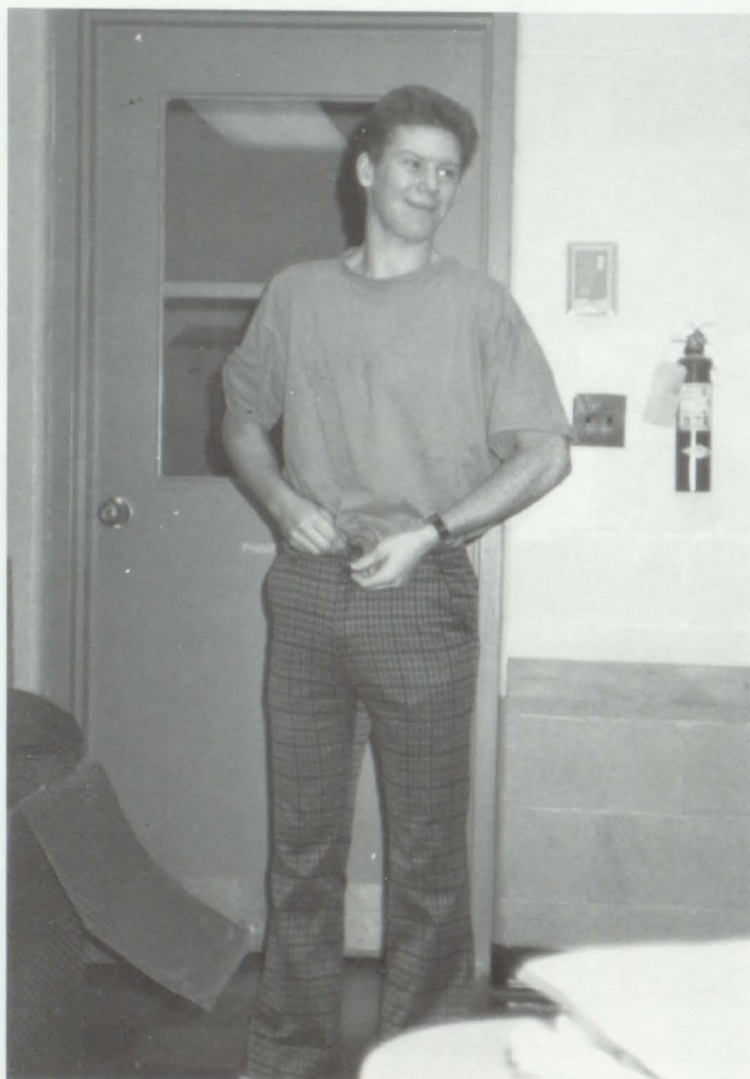

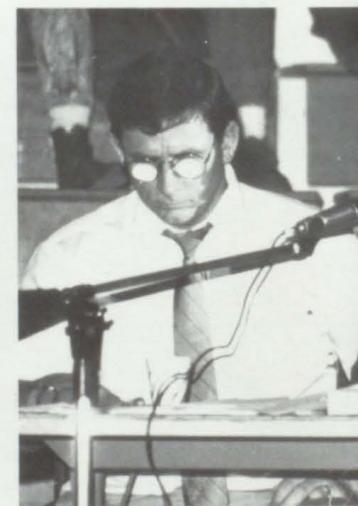

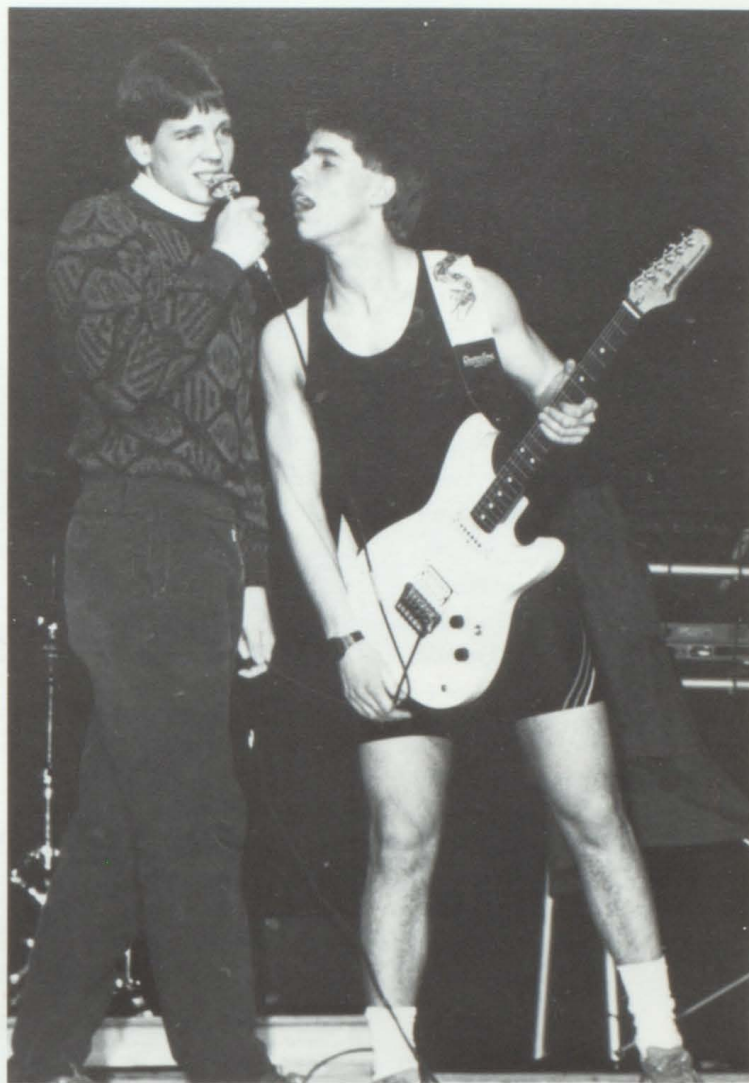

only about television, but also of local interest such as G.H.S.'s own cafeteria, or "Name that Car Part."

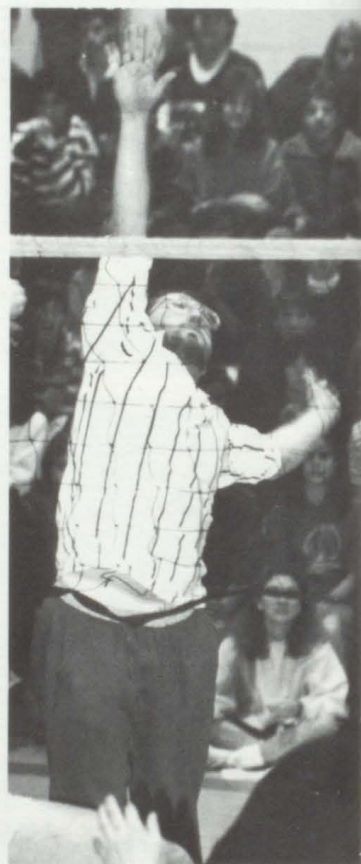
Some other events included student volleyball, pie eating, trivial pursuit, Pictionary, a suitcase race, and a grapefruit pass.

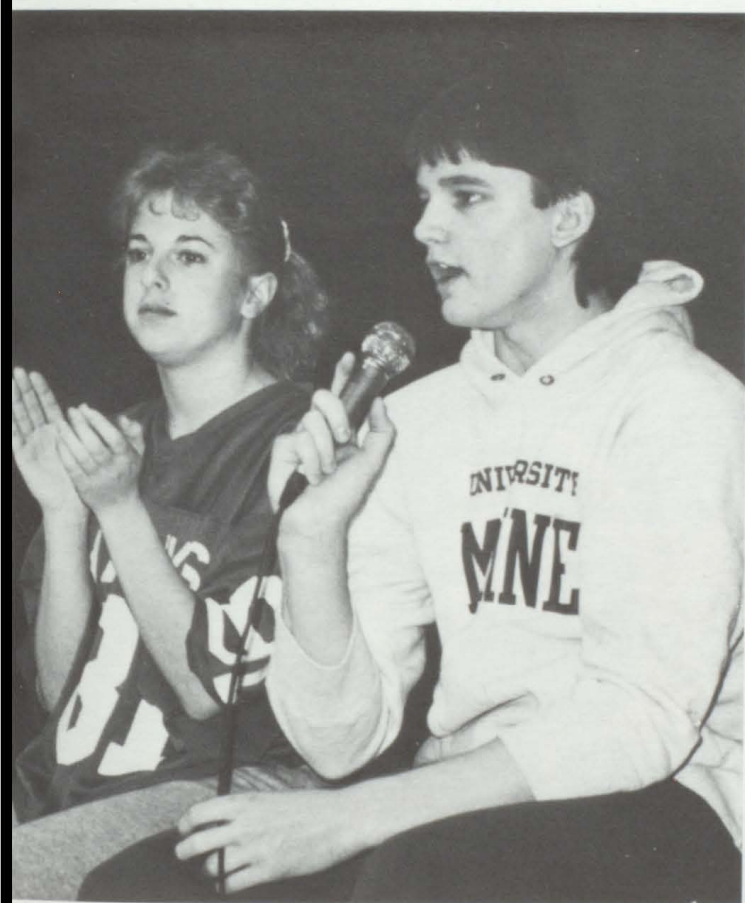
Chris Morehead tunes in to the F.M. simulcast of teacher volleyball.

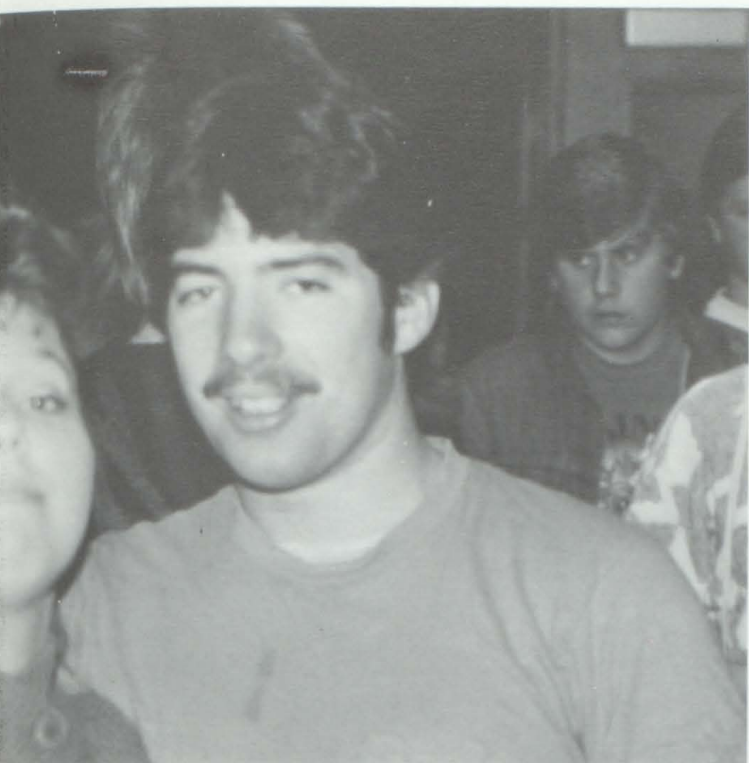

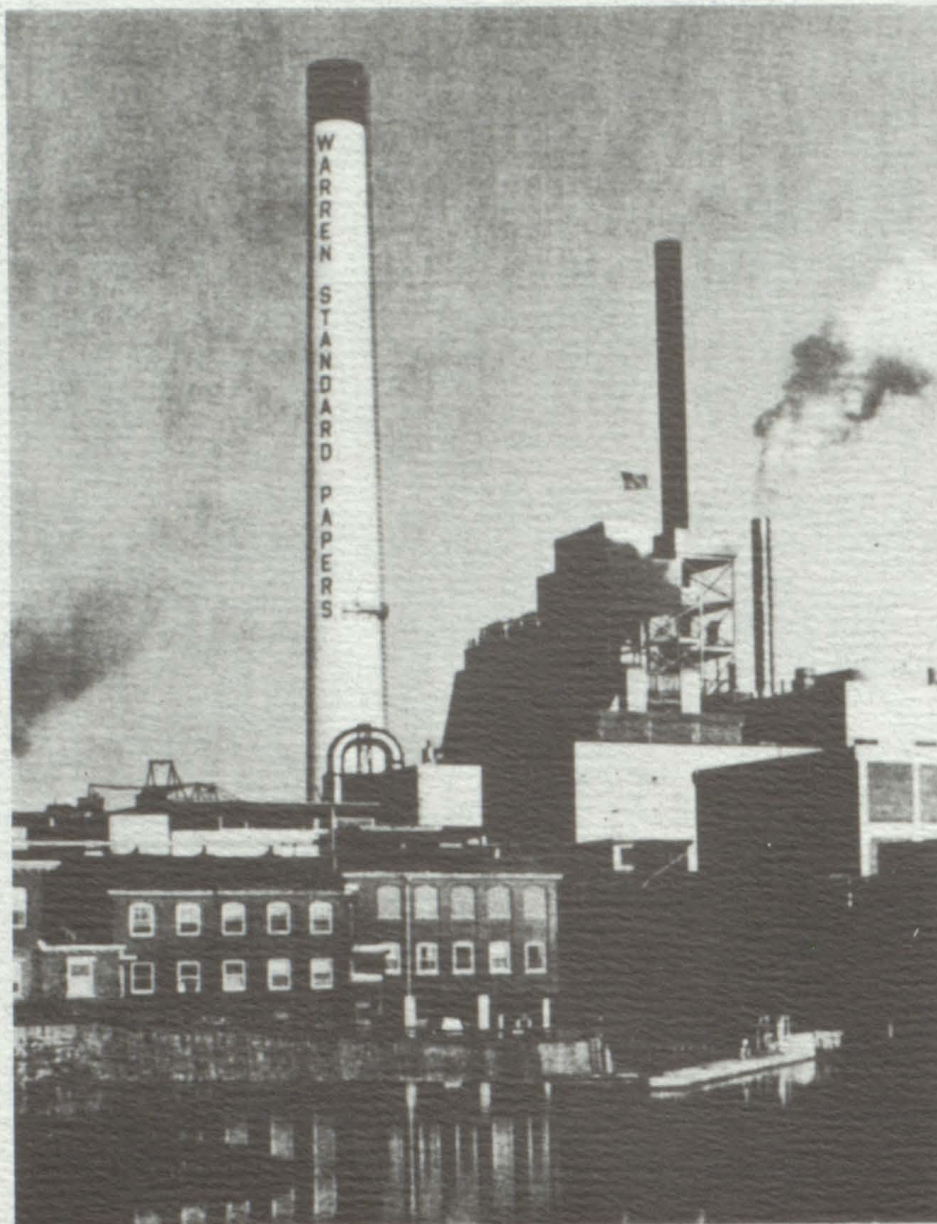

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People, Process, and Change

Last year the department of education announced a project to restructure schools. The intent of the project was to develop a variety of models that would better meet the needs of students and to do it more equitably. In addition, emphasis was placed on the need to identify the processes to use when designing a high school. To meet these goals, high schools across the state were asked to submit restructuring proposals.

Gorham High Schools proposal was accepted and funded by the State Department of Education in early September, 1988. It was developed and written by a group of 17 people, including teachers, administrators, and Lee Goldsberry, a university consultant. The commitment to change is evident at the high school. In the fall, the restructuring team expanded to include 20 faculty members in addition to members of the community and five students who are pictured at right. The committee's basic goal was to plan a process of "real, lasting, and ongoing change."





The Gorham High School Social Studies department is in the midst of major curriculum changes this year. Social Studies teachers are beginning "America in the World, Part I" which is replacing Junior American History. In the beginning of next year, Senior Government and Economics classes will be converted to America in the World, Part II. This two year course can be described as an "Events-Centered issue approach" in which a particular historical event is studied through issues (Social, Political, and Economic, Human Nature and Environmental), then connected to contemporary situations. Finally, the curriculum is citizenship action oriented. Students participate in activities within an actual community context. This year's Junior class, for example, began their America in the World (Part I) by studying "America 1988" in which over fifty community members were interviewed about their daily lives. The results of these findings were made into "newspapers" of America today.

One Small Step for Man . . .

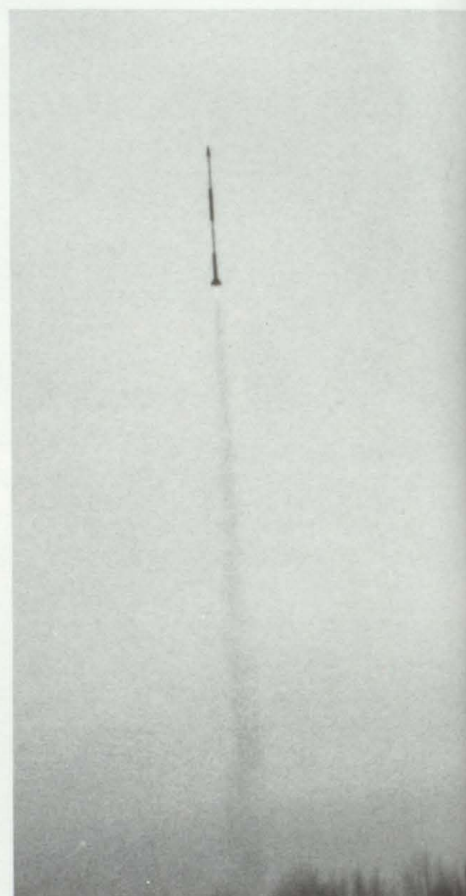

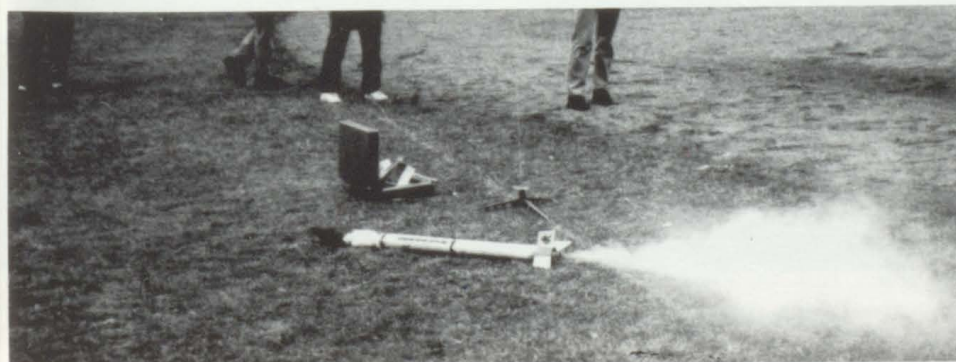

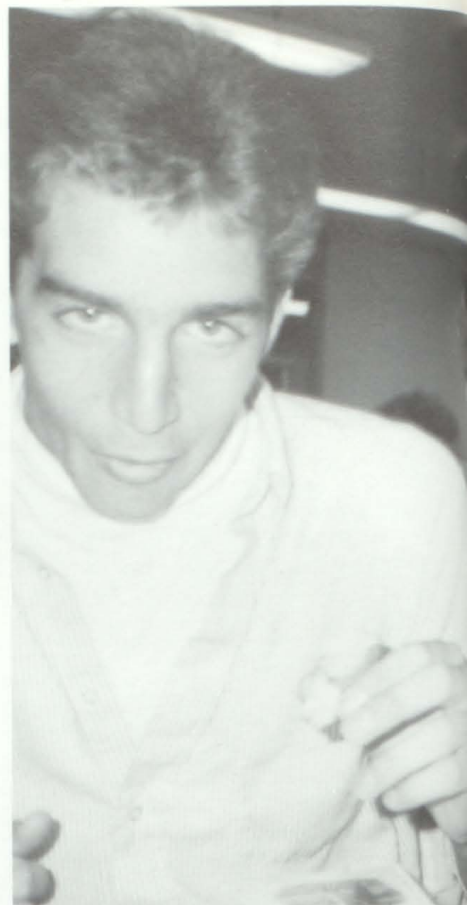

lieve it's true? You've made it. Pat yourself on the back. Now wasn't high school the best years of your life?



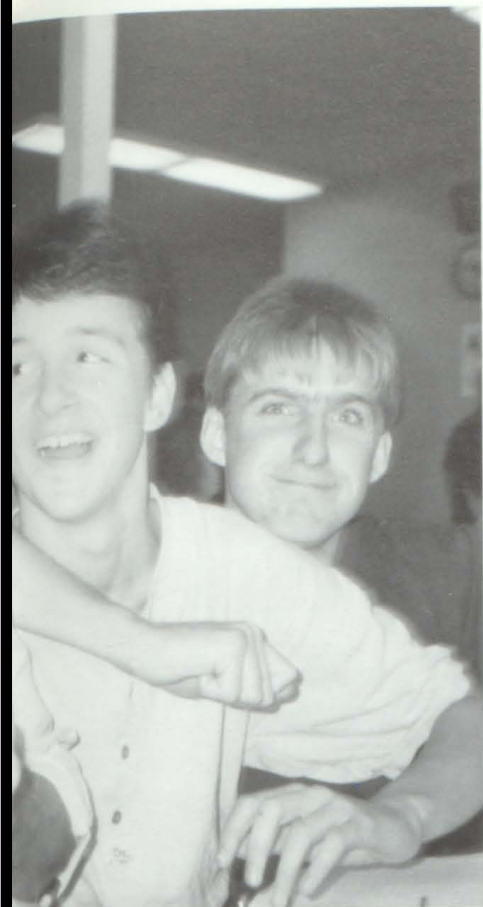

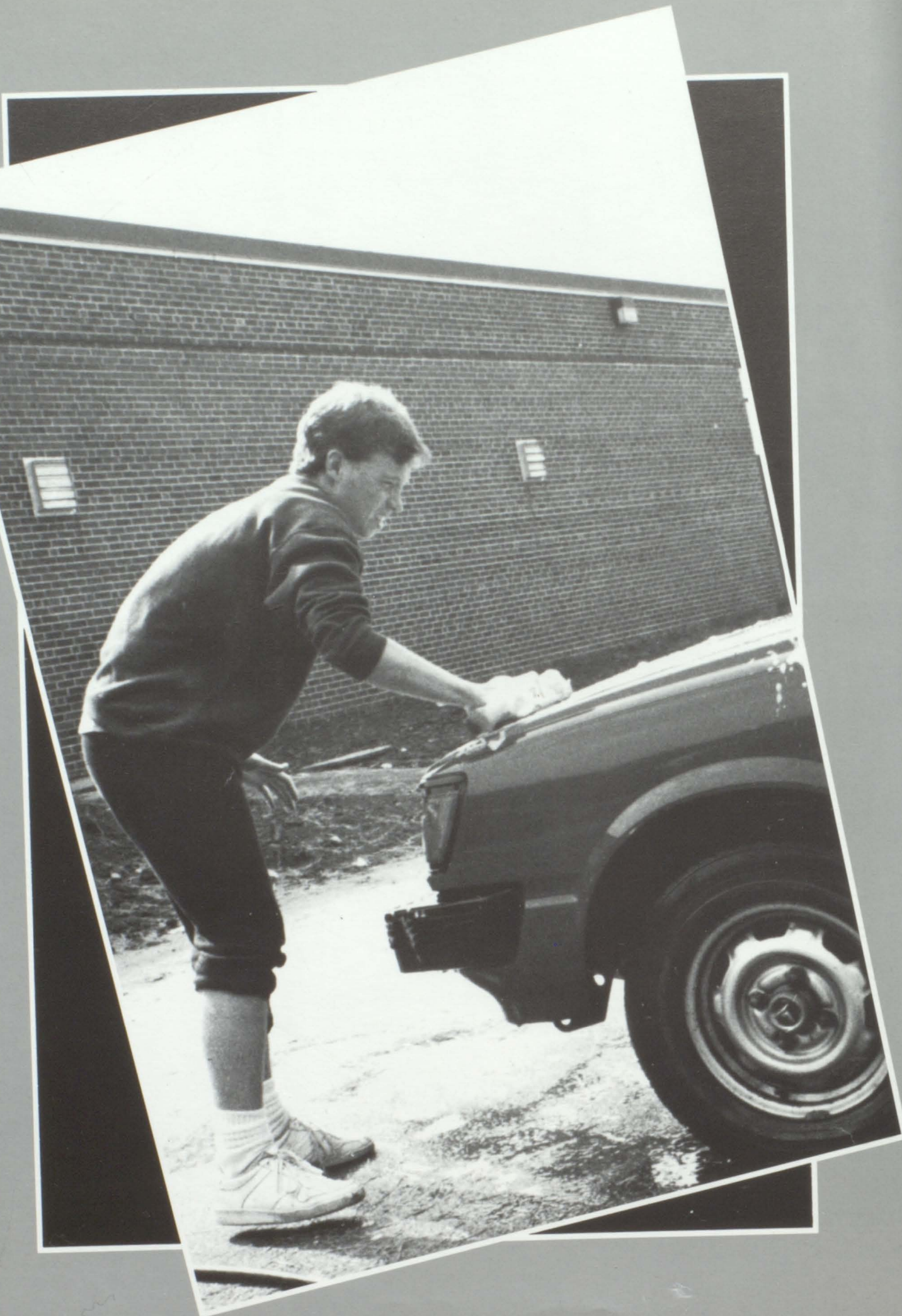

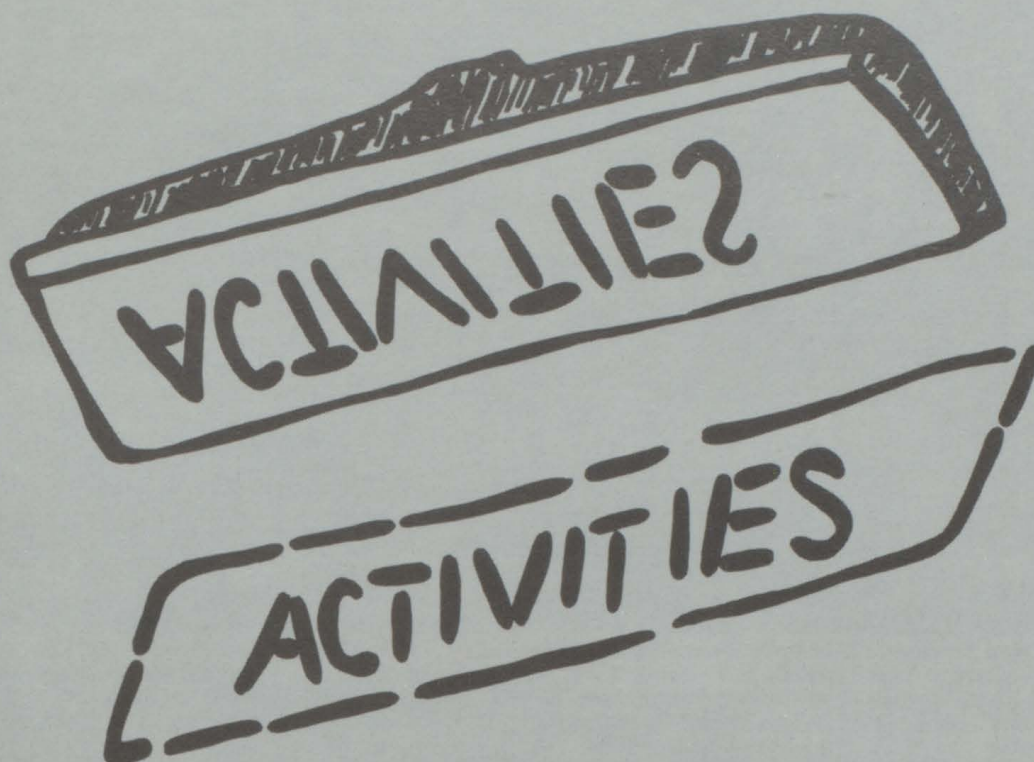

Although some people were in Chorus mainly for the fine arts credit, most people had a good time singing and most people learned a lot.

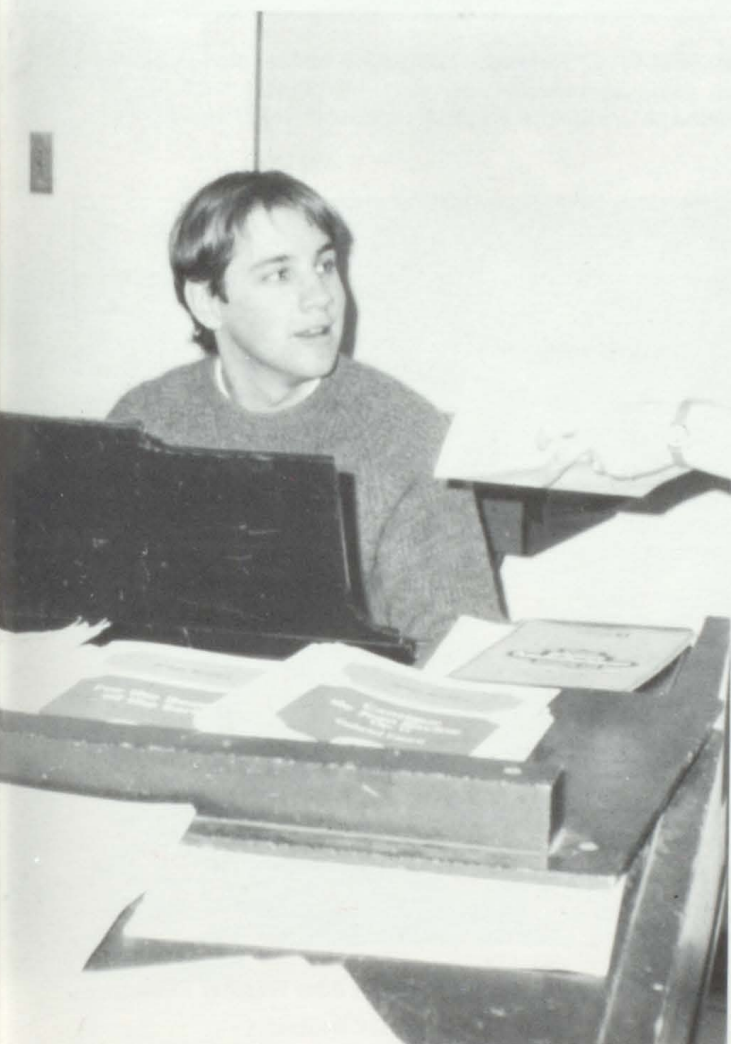

Begun in 1984, the Gorham High School Debate Team has earned state-wide recognition for their performances in Oregon Style, Lincoln-Douglas Style and speech events. The Debate Team meets weekly for practice and attends between 8-12 tournaments each season from roughly the first of October to the middle of April. Debaters can choose between three major categories of competition. The first is Oregon Style Debate in which pairs of debaters work together over a year-long topic. Secondly, Lincoln-Douglas Style Debate is done individually, debating over a value topic which changes monthly. 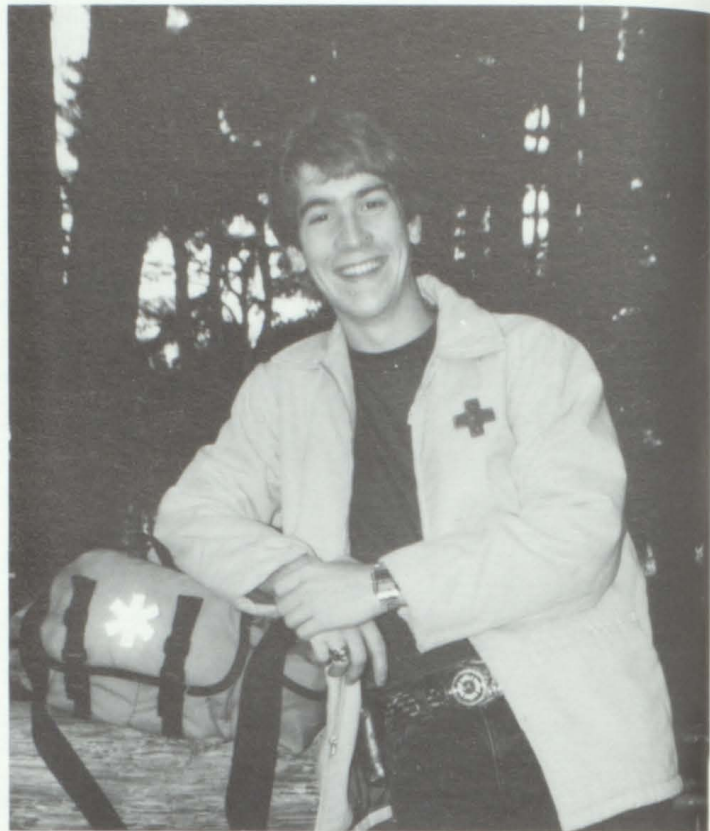

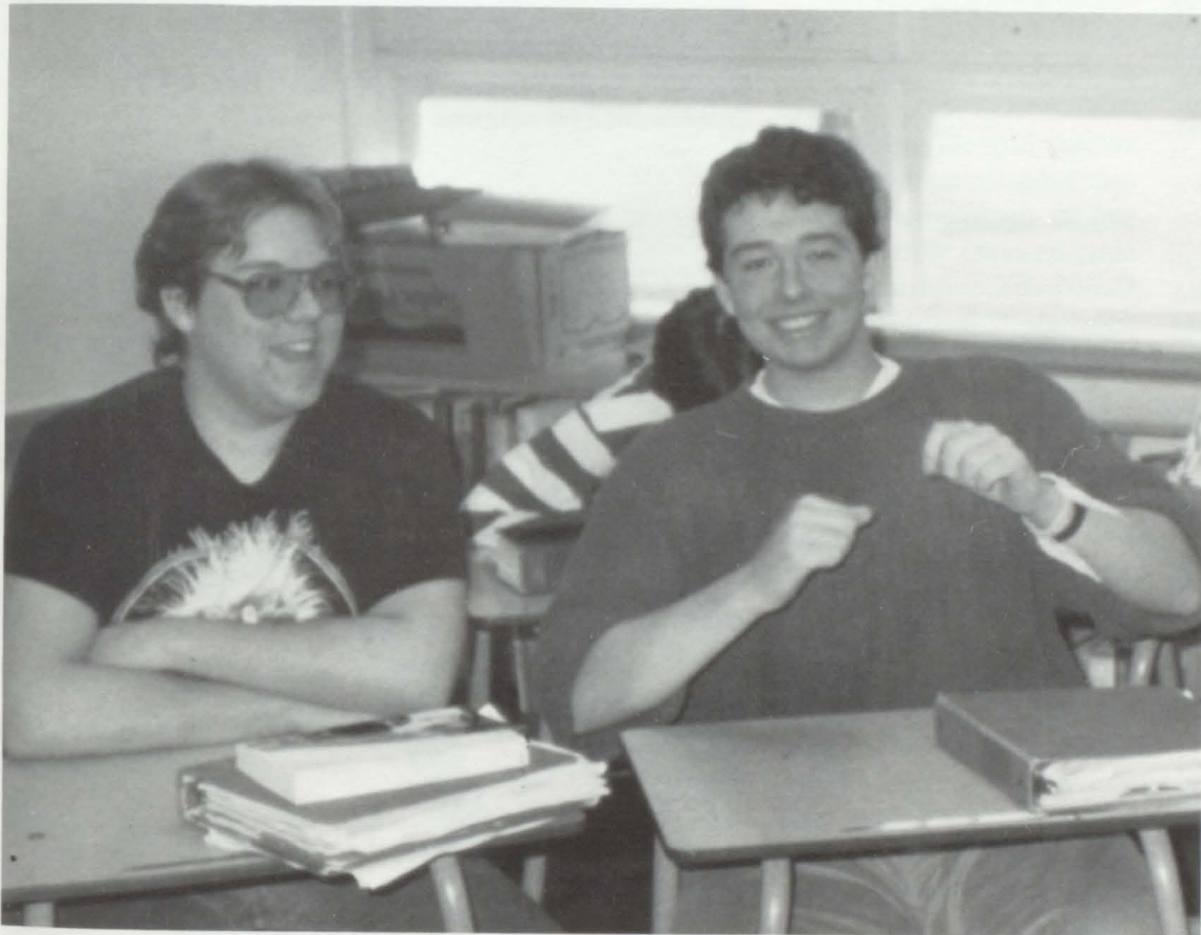

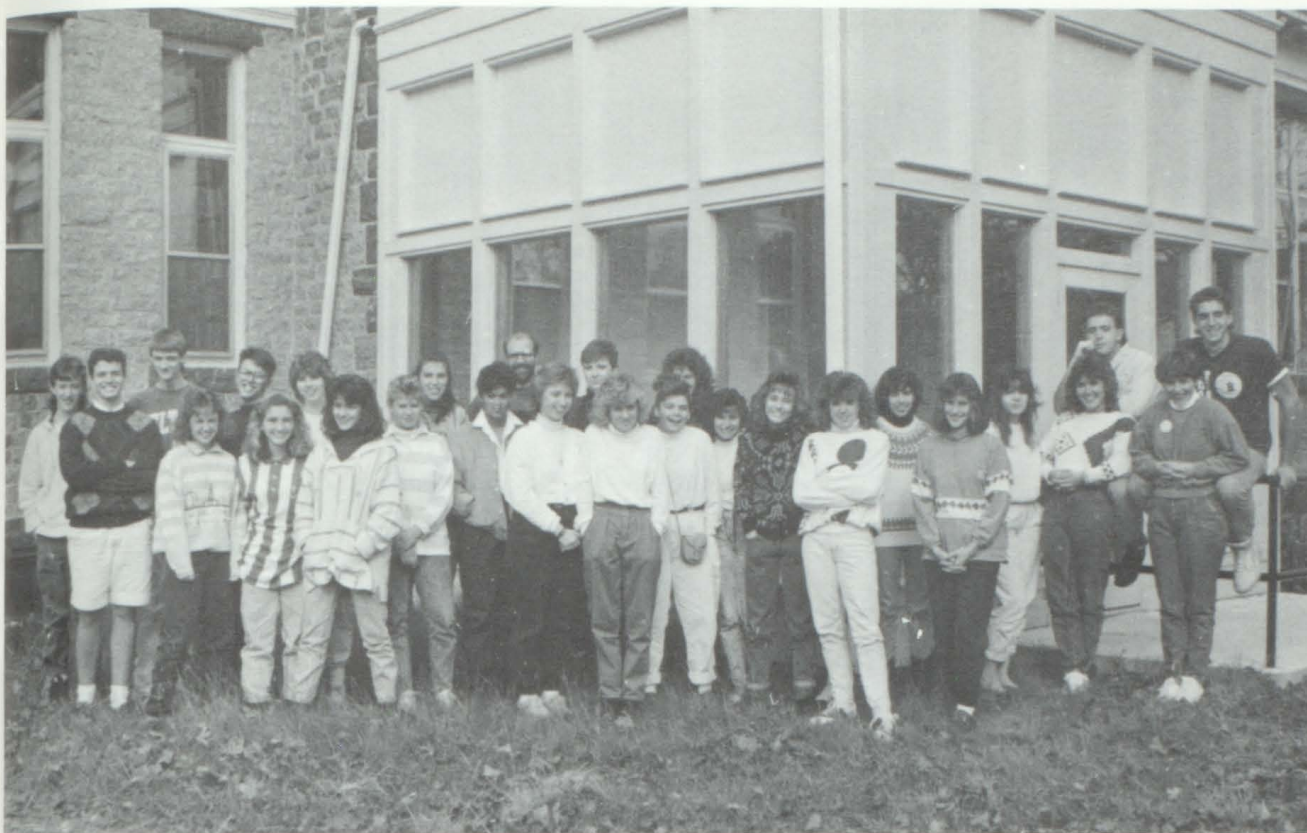
GIRLS' STATE

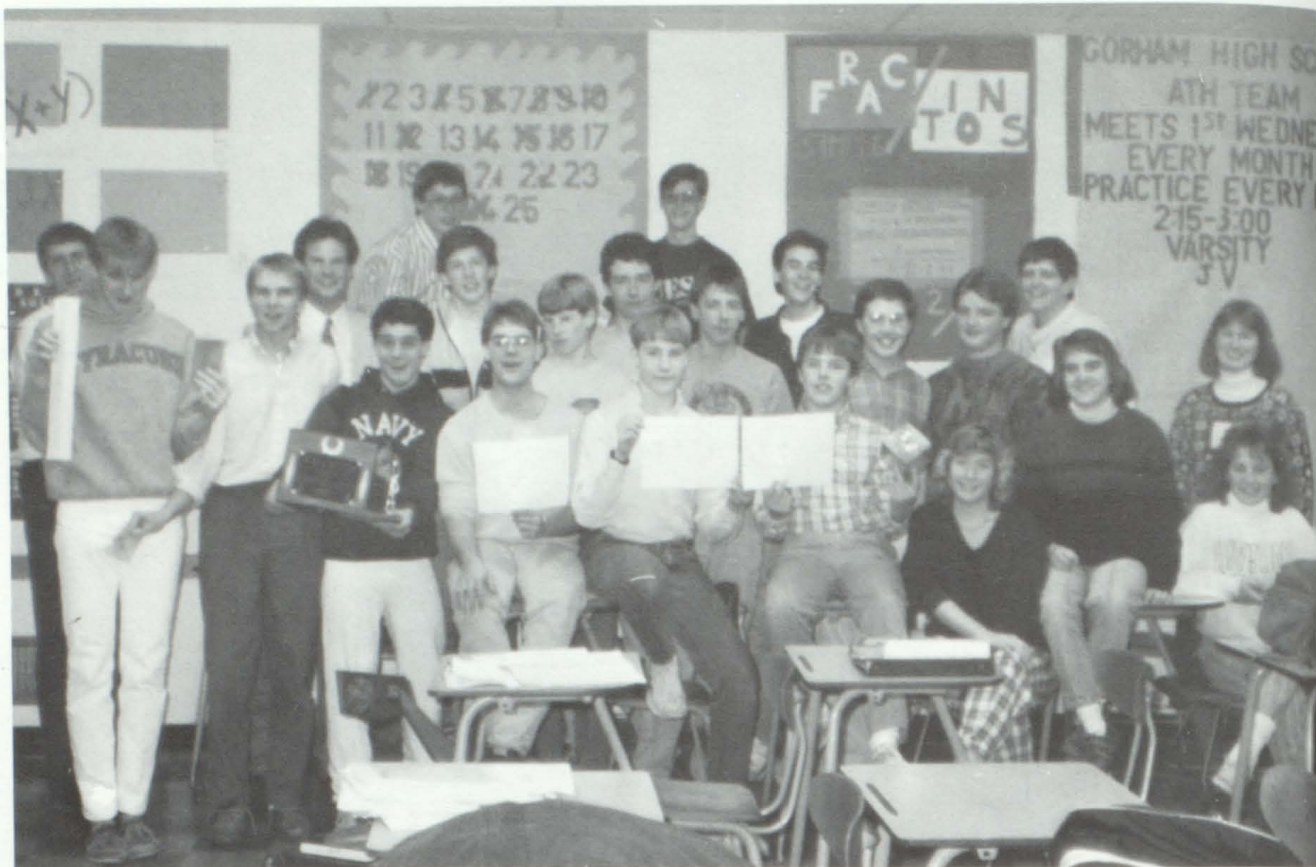

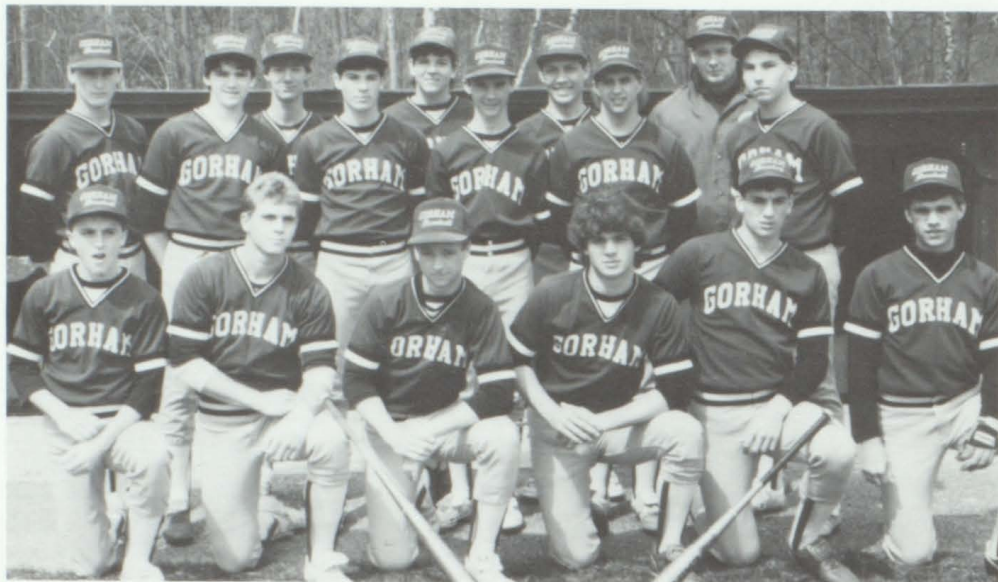

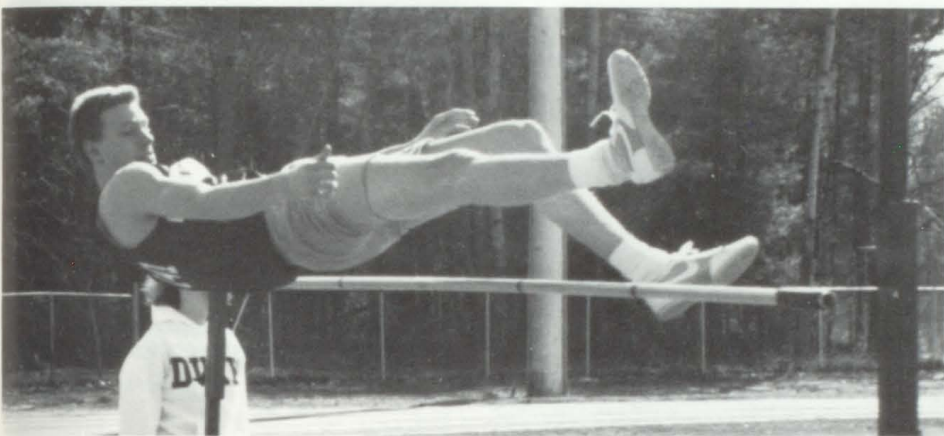

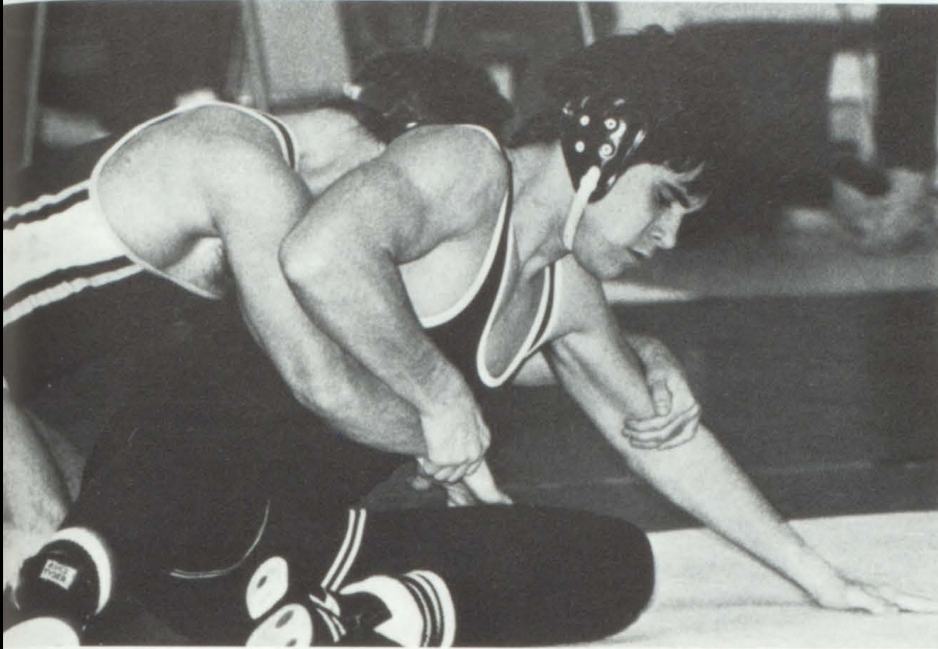

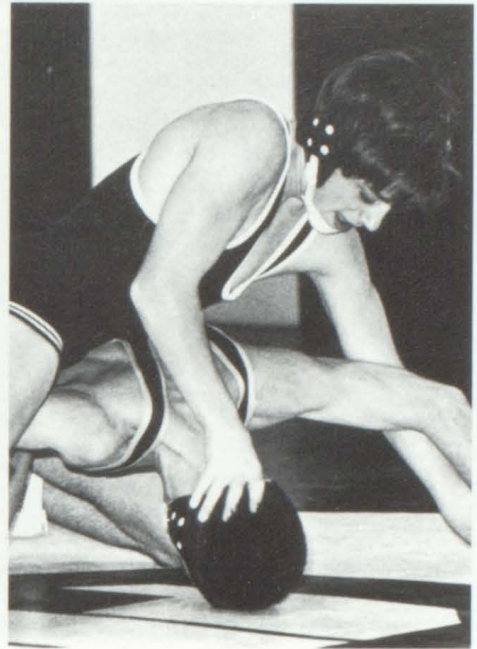

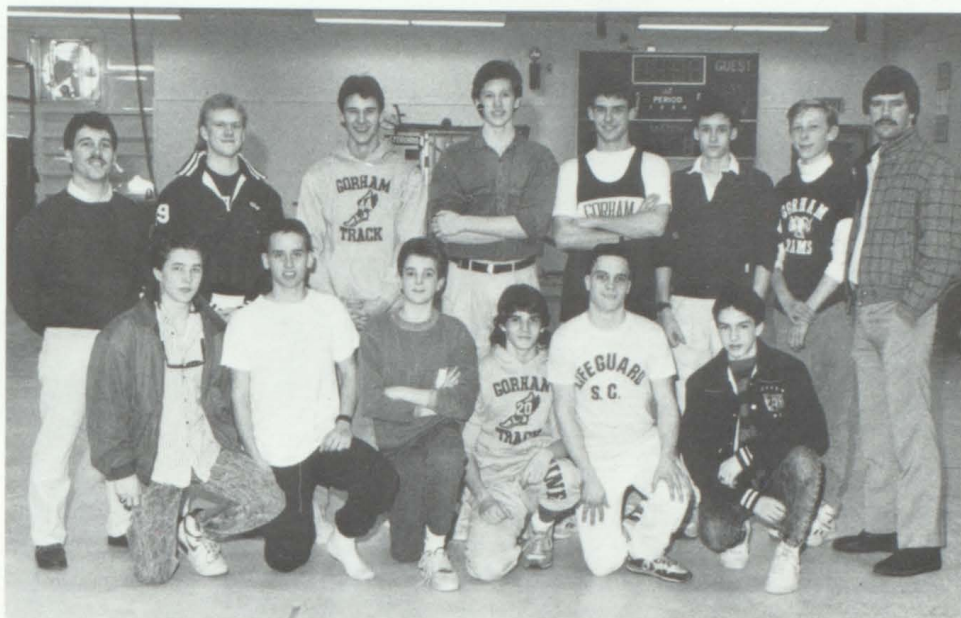

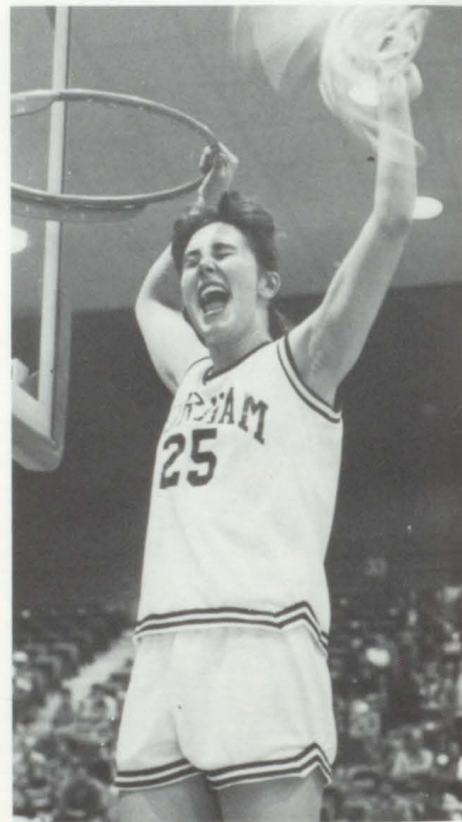

The 1988-89 Boy's Basketball team enjoyed one of its finest seasons. Regarded as one of the finest teams in the state, the Rams posted an impressive 17-1 regular season record, the finest of Kevin Jenkins' five-year tenure as head coach. The boys scored an average of 85 points per game while holding their opponents to an average of 59 points. After a headline grabbing 6-0 start, including a record setting 101-54 stomping of Wells, the boys headed into the Portland Christmas Tournament to prove its strength versus several excellent Class A programs. They did so by making it to the championship game. The Rams struggled, but still only lost by two points to Oxford Hills. The tourney toughened team then reeled five more wins before facing the Kennebunk Rams, a battle for the Conference Championship. Kennebunk was ranked first in Class A, Gorham first in Class B. Both clubs were unbeaten in regular season play. The stage was set. In what

was called "the game of the year" by several writers our Rams reeled off the last seven points to salvage a 74-71 victory on hostile Kennebunk court.

After four more consecutive wins, the boys lost their only regular season game to Falmouth on a last second shot. With one game remaining in the season, the Rams had to beat Yarmouth to secure a #1 seed in the Western Maine Tournament. Smarting from the one loss to Falmouth, the Rams crushed the Clippers 78-56.

In the Western Maine Tournament the boys edged Rumford in the first round, receiving a tremendous bench performance by Senior power-forward Chad Davis. In the second round game Senior Co-Captain Scott Holleman dominated the board despite the huge size of the Madison Team. David Pelletier, also a Senior Co-Captain, broke the game open in the second half with 12 consecutive points. This set up the Western Maine Final with Lin-

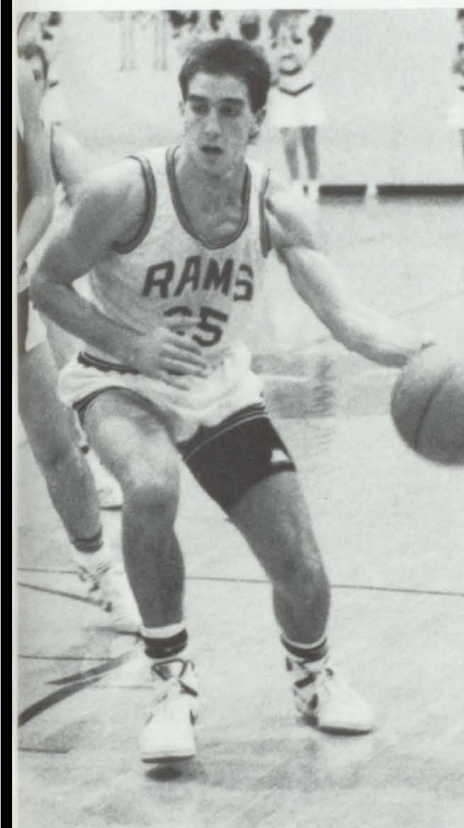

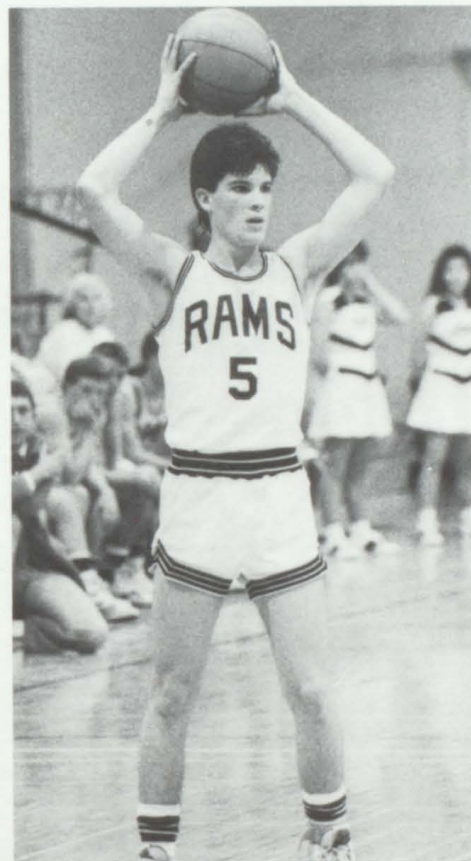

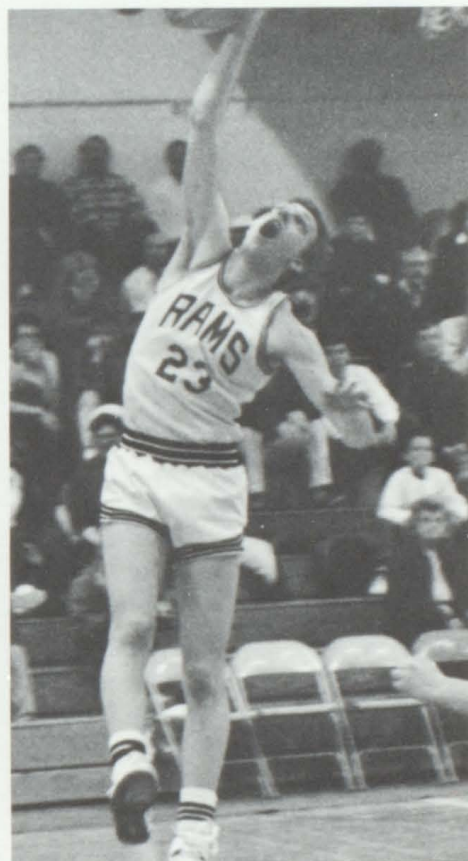

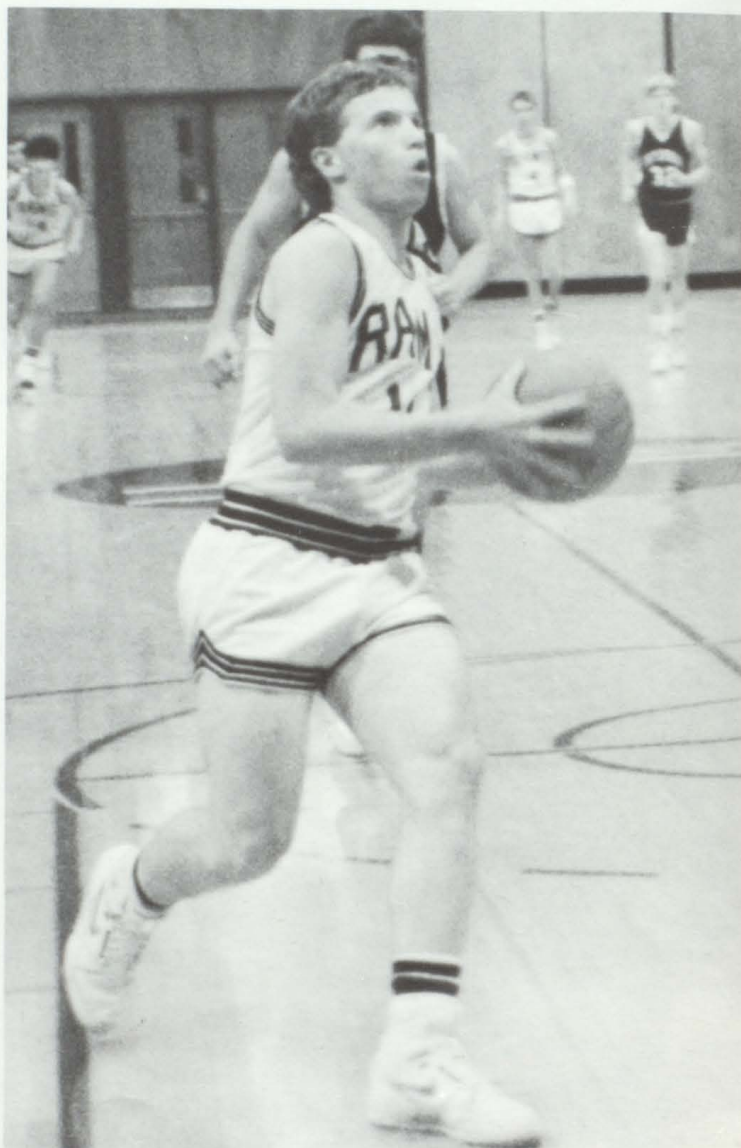

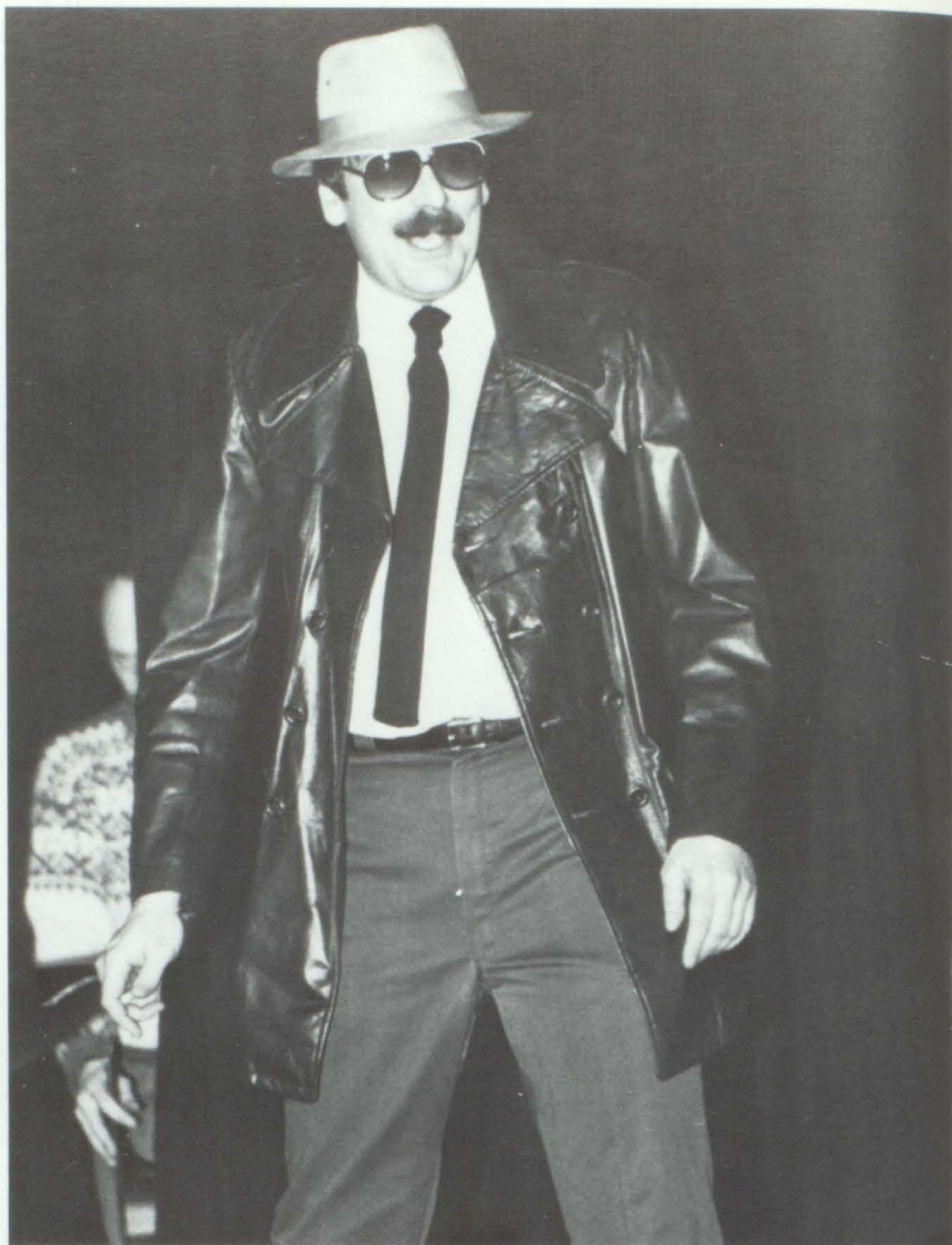

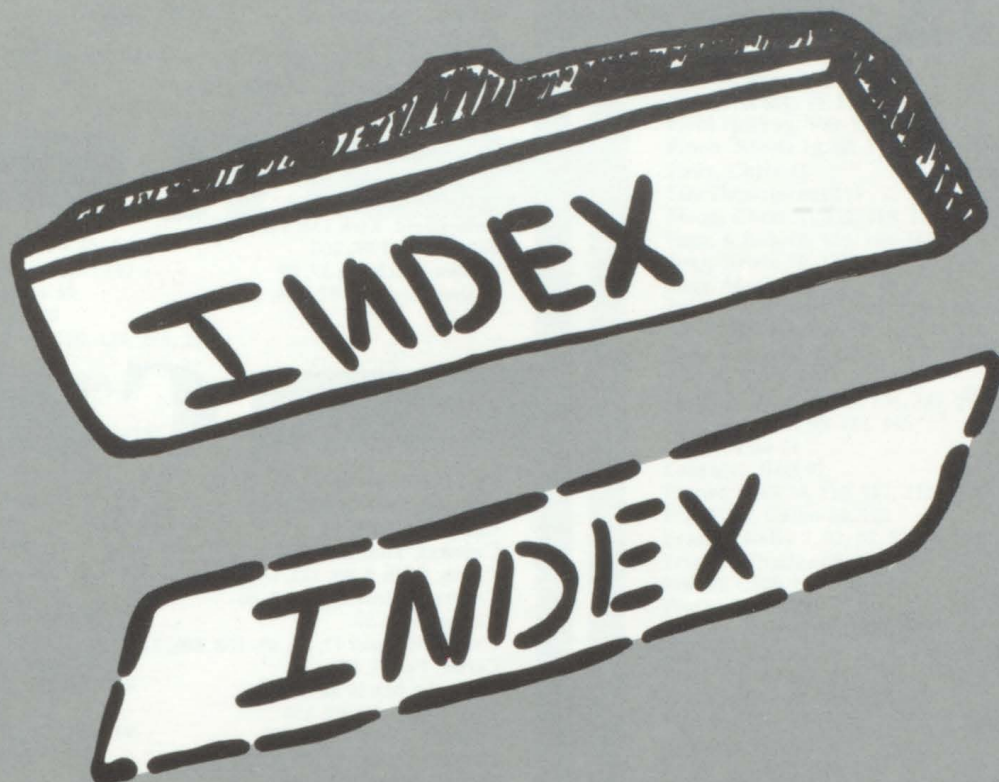

COLOPHON

The COVER was designed at a Schola brain-storming session early in the school year. The background is in Taylor Publishing brick in 60% maroon. The logo was drawn by Dave Hill, copied, and used throughout the book.

The THEME was voted on at a large meeting in September of 1988. Malibu print in eight point bold for captions and ten point plain face for body copy was used.

The STUDENT LIFE section uses an eight column spread with 100% black screened lines. Headlines are reversed out in 48 point Malibu bold in these lines.

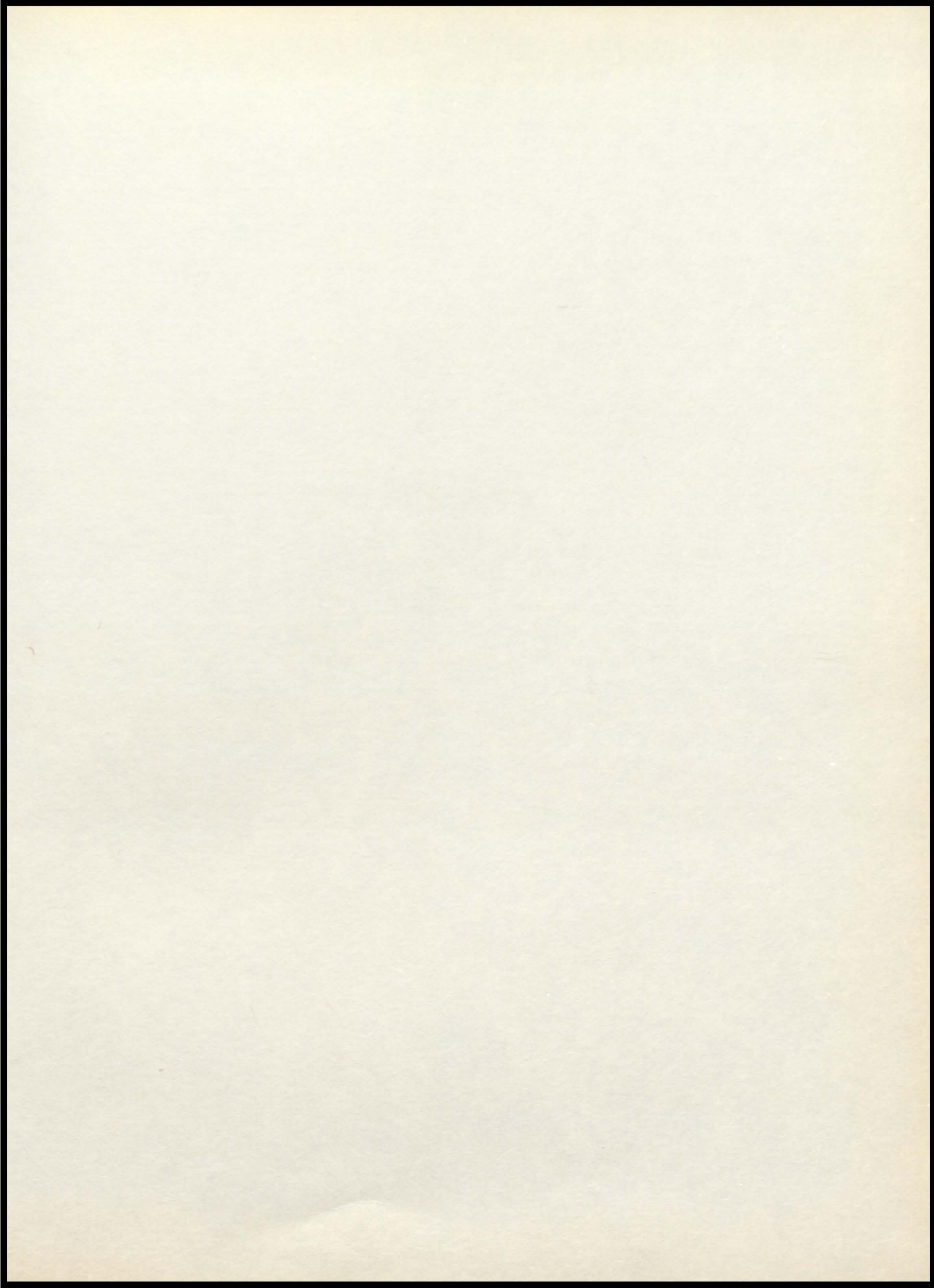
"GRAFFITI" was printed on Gainesborough Silver. Each advertisement was bordered by a three point rule line. The cover title was hand-made in 60 point brush.

The PEOPLE section also utilizes eight column layout. the seniors' names are in ten point Malibu bold, while their writeups are in six point bold. Underclassmen and faculty are in eight point Malibu bold.

In ACADEMICS, an eight column spread layout was used. The "Making Our Mark" interviews were conducted by Carmen Nobel. Lipstick on a napkin was used to scrawl the check mark.

The goal of the ACTIVITIES section was to have a group picture, a story, and some candid shots of each club. Stories were printed in ten point Malibu.

The SPORTS layout had a new feature this year. Scoreboards were sketched out, copied, and mounted on artboard. 100% black screen was uniform across the tops of near all sports pages. Again, eight column layout was used.
